Emergency Preparation and Response

- Use established communication systems
- Keep emergency phone numbers and GPS coordinates by every phone, in all vehicles/equipment, and programmed into cell phones
 - Record GPS coordinates for each pasture/field/facility
 - Include “place” names for easy reference examples The Jones Place, The Windmill Pasture
 - Make note of any distinct landmarks that can be identified by air
- Keep a first aid kit in each all buildings, vehicles, and equipment
- Carry an IN CASE OF EMERGENCY CARD with you or keep a sealed copy in each first aid kit to be opened in the event of an emergency (blank cards found at www.mtagrisafety.com)
- Maintain active First Aid, CPR, and Stop the Bleed certificates
- Become familiar with emergency response systems and warning systems in place for your area
- Keep an accurate record of inventory, including: livestock, crops, machinery/equipment, hazardous substances
- Only provide emergency assistance when safe to do so – **You cannot help others if you are hurt yourself!**
- NEVER attempt to touch an individual that you suspect has been electrocuted until you are certain the source of electricity has been deenergized
